

## Free Public Access to Reading Resources — Why it Matters

The availability of books in a home is often cited as an indicator of later academic success for children. So how does Providence measure up? Not so well, according to Unite for Literacy's interactive Book Desert Map, which uses a combination of data sources to estimate the average number of books in homes.

According to the map, six PCL libraries serve neighborhoods where 10% or fewer households own 100 books or more. Estimated percentage of households – surrounding each PCL location – owning 100 books or more:

39% Fox Point 5% Knight Memorial 34% Mount Pleasant 5% Olneyville 44% Rochambeau 5% Smith Hill 5% South Providence 10% Wanskuck

7% Washington Park

Substantial numbers of children in Providence have access to very few books at home—or even none at all. That's why PCL matters. Regardless of age, background and economic circumstance, community libraries empower patrons to change their lives for the better.

### Estimated % of RI homes with more than 100 books



Thanks to everyone who helped make that dream a reality! The Board and I look forward to working with the new Library Director, Jeff Cannell, and to another amazing year!

## **United Way Grant Takes PCL into Schoolyards**

Thanks to a three-year grant from United Way RI, PCL has been able to take its mobile library on the road to bring summer reading opportunities to students at 10 PPSD elementary schools and several City recreation centers. Carrying 4,000 popular books, a sound system, shade tents, tables and chairs, life-sized board games, and mobile hot spots for WiFi access and computers, the Mobile Library visited each schoolyard weekly and served free breakfast and lunch to students as part of the City of Providence *Summer Meals* program. In an important example of data sharing and school-library collaboration, PPSD's Office of Research, Planning and Accountability will analyze data to determine if students who read 20 minutes a day throughout the summer maintained or gained reading skills over the summer months.

## Fighting Summer Learning Loss, Raising Literacy Levels

It's a serious problem: 60% of Providence students experience summer reading loss and 51% experience summer math loss. We were delighted when Cheryl Space, PCL Youth Services Coordinator, and Michelle Novello, PCL Program Coordinator, were invited to join the Mayor's special taskforce and lend their considerable expertise to the study of summer learning loss in Providence and to the creation of this year's Summer Learning Passport. As a library, we are all too aware of the problem of summer learning loss, and this year, we have taken further strides in providing answers.



## **Taking on the ConnectED Library Challenge**

The ConnectED Library Challenge, a national initiative launched by the White

House in 2015, strengthens partnerships between mayor's offices, schools and libraries so that every child enrolled in school can receive a public library card. In Spring 2016, Mayor Elorza, Superintendent of Providence Schools Chris Maher and PCL joined forces to take on the challenge in Providence. PCL has already issued more than 1,300 new library cards to students from selected kindergarten, first and second grade classes. Eventually, all 24,000 Providence public school students will receive a card. Providence, through PCL, is the first city in Rhode Island to have committed to the ConnectED Library Challenge.

## **Teens Provide Inspiration with Clubs and Workshops**

Thanks to a \$15,000 grant from the Otto H. York Foundation, PCL recruited nine high school student interns, to create compelling youth programs, mentor younger children and serve on PCI's Teen Advisory Council. One intern was attached to each library location. Programs, which were inspired by the teens' own interests, included debating skills, stand up "improv," film making, photography, art, creative writing, global issues, science, health and girls' clubs.

## Summer It Up!

Knight Memorial hosted a 6-week summer camp/tutoring program for rising 6th graders entering Gilbert Stuart Middle School. In its fourth year, the 2016 Summer It Up program offered extended hours to allow for swimming lessons, recreational play and lunch. Providence teachers worked closely with 35 volunteer tutors to improve math and literacy skills, engaging 25 students in challenging but fun activities. ## **SERVING THE LATINO COMMUNITY**

### Feria del Libro Celebrates 500 Years of Latinos in the US

Feria del Libro y Las Artes de Providence returned for a second year at the Providence Career and Technical Academy. The two day festival featured more than 30 Latino writers, musicians, crafts and spectacular displays of folk dancing. Respected professors Julio Ortega (Brown University) and David Espinoza (RI College) led discussions of the PBS documentary Latino Americans: 500 Years of History. The events were supported by a grant from the American Library Association, PBS and the National Endowment for the Humanities, as well as funds from the Rhode Island State Council on the Arts, Providence Schools, Neighborhood Health Plan of Rhode Island and Sodexo. PCL's Latino Program Coordinator was given the Latino Community Leadership award by the Rhode Island State Council on the Arts in recognition of her work to advance and promote Latino arts and culture in Rhode Island. The award was presented in October 2015 at a reception celebrating RISCA's 14th Annual Latin American Art Exhibit at the Atrium Gallery in Providence. Carolina Briones, pictured right, curated the art exhibit, Somos Latinos in America, herself. She is a well-known and highly respected figure in the Latino arts community of Rhode Island.

### Dia de los Niños Gets Some STEAM!

Multi-talented artist Ildefonso "Poncho" Franco returned to Providence in April 2016 to present a series of mask making and animation workshops. A grant from the Association for Library Services to Children allowed PCL to incorporate STEAM (science, technology, engineering, the arts and math) components into a workshop series that led up to El Día de los Niños/El Día de los Libros (children's day/book day) on April 30. Minority populations are underrepresented in STEAM education and professional fields, so these workshops were an exciting opportunity for our young patrons.

## Language Courses Remain Very Popular

Demand for GED in Spanish, ESL and Learn Spanish classes continued to outstrip supply. Six students obtained their GED certificates, 27 passed between one and four exams and a total of 124 students followed the GED preparation courses. A GED certificate is a virtual necessity for people seeking employment or entry into educational programs and PCL is one of the few places that offers free Spanish-language GED preparation courses.

## StoryCorps@your Library

One of ten libraries nationwide to be awarded a grant to create a community oral history project in 2015, PCL recorded more than 70 interviews with patrons, staff and community partners based on the traditional Storycorps model. The conversations created a remarkable collection and a fascinating reflection of the diverse people of Providence. Additionally, PCL worked with Moses Brown School on an educational module about oral histories. PCL will retain copies of the recorded conversations to build a local archive that eventually will be accessible to library users and scholars. The recording equipment will continue be used and loaned to community organizations so that they may collect their own stories.





## The Neighborhood Comes to the Rescue!

When Olneyville Library was damaged by flooding following heavy rains on April 23, Friends of Olneyville, library staff, local businesses and residents organized a fundraiser. "Re-Place, Re-Store, Re-Open Olneyville Library" raised \$10,000 in just two hours. The money will be used to buy new furniture and other items.
